

Federal Recreation Pass Programs

Federal Recreation Fees Support Our National Heritage

Entrance and use fees for federal lands are not only used for conserving our nation's land, wildlife, waterways and historical sites, but are used to develop, maintain and improve visitor services and recreation opportunities.

Federal Recreation Passes are Convenient

Federal recreation passes are convenient because they provide an alternative to paying entrance or use fees for every visit. Following are descriptions of six federal recreation pass programs. Each description reviews the pass, which fees it covers, whether it's annual or lifetime, and how you can obtain it. Please keep in mind that while the passes cover entrance fees, they may not cover most use and special recreation permit fees.

Authorized by Congress

The Land and Water Conservation Fund Act (LWCFA), passed by Congress in 1965, and the Emergency Wetlands Resources Act (EWRA), passed by Congress in 1986, require federal recreation fees in some national parks, forests, wildlife refuges, or outdoor recreation areas. Where this symbol  is being displayed, an LWCFA fee is being charged.

There are Three Types of Fees that may be Charged

1. Entrance Fees


For entering designated federal recreation areas.

2. Use Fees

For using visitor services such as campgrounds, swimming areas, boat launches, parking, waterfowl blinds, cave tours, or specialized interpretive services in designated federal recreation areas.

3. Special Recreation Permit Fees

For specialized uses that require a permit, such as group activities, recreational events and use of motorized recreational vehicles in designated federal recreation areas.

*A private vehicle is defined as any noncommercial vehicle that is being used for private recreational purposes. This includes passenger automobiles, vans, campers, and company-owned vehicles that are leased or rented for private recreation purposes.

In some cases where per person use fees are charged, the 50% discount will be given to the **pass owner only; for example, cave tours, elevator services, or camping.

Passes are not replaceable, refundable, or transferable. Annual passes and National Parks Pass may be purchased as gifts.
