




Rules and Tips for Pet Owners

These simple safety precautions and pet rules are provided to help protect your pet and assure that everyone enjoys this facility. *Welcome!*






The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers welcomes you and your pet to this water-resource project. For your enjoyment and the safety of your pet, we have established the following rules regarding the control of pets. Your observance of these rules while visiting Corps of Engineers water-resource projects will make your visit and the visits of others more pleasant and enjoyable. The following Title 36 Federal Code of Regulations regarding animals will be enforced for the benefit of all visitors:

- Pets must be kept on a leash no longer than 6 feet and must be kept under control at all times.
- With the exception of seeing-eye dogs, animals are not permitted on any designated swimming beach or in any public building, unless so posted.
- Owners shall not allow their pets to bite, molest, or annoy other visitors. Please don't let your pet disturb the peace of the park.
- Owners must remove their animal's fecal matter before leaving the immediate area where the fecal matter was deposited.

Before you leave your campsite, picnic site, dock facility, or grounds, please make certain the site is clean for the next visitor. Animal fecal matter must be picked up and deposited in a litter receptacle. Thank you.



When traveling with pets, you should observe these special safety precautions:

- Be a good neighbor to your fellow recreationist. Following the rules will ensure that your pet won't harm anyone, interrupt the activities of others, or dig holes.
 - Leash your pet to keep control and avoid injury. Automobiles and bikes travel throughout our project areas, and accidents can occur when animals are loose.
 - Be careful about leaving your pet in your car.
The inside of a car heats very quickly. For example: On an 85-degree day, the temperature inside your car (with the windows slightly open) will reach 102 degrees in 10 minutes, and 120 degrees in 30 minutes. A dog's normal body temperature is 101.5-102.2 degrees Fahrenheit. Your dog can withstand a body temperature of 107-108 degrees for only a short time before suffering brain damage, even death.
 - If your dog is overcome by heat exhaustion, you can give immediate first aid by immersing the animal in cold water until body temperature is lowered.
